Aims and Scope

The Journal of Collegiate Emergency Medical Services (JCEMS) [ISSN: 2576-3687 (Print), 2567-3695 (Online)] is the official, peer-reviewed journal of the National Collegiate Emergency Medical Services Foundation. Established in 2017, JCEMS publishes the only scholarly journal and news source dedicated exclusively to the collegiate and campus-based EMS community. Our mission is to promote leadership, clinical excellence, and original research. We stand side-by-side with collegiate EMS agencies, campus safety departments, and university health centers to protect the health and safety of the people on our campuses.

The field of campus-based prehospital emergency care is concerningly underrepresented in the scholarly literature and in popular sources. We strive to provide a voice to the collegiate EMS community and to spur a revolution in collegiate EMS research. In addition to publishing high quality, open access content from recognized scholars and experts, we encourage and mentor budding leaders, clinicians, and researchers –students and young alumni– to develop high caliber articles and research projects.

JCEMS publishes seasonal print issues and provides all content online on its open-access website (CollegeEMS. com). We welcome original research manuscripts, case studies, and reviews. In addition, we invite pieces featuring news and commentary, expert perspectives and opinions, advice on best practices, and letters to the editor.

Partnership with JCEMS

JCEMS and NCEMSF collaborate to help guide collegiate EMS providers and organizations in the development of research projects and the production of publishable work.

To ensure rigor and independence in the editorial process, the JCEMS Editorial Board maintains editorial autonomy. The NCEMSF Board of Directors has no authority to determine the content to be published in JCEMS, and members of the NCEMSF Board of Directors are not eligible to serve on the JCEMS Editorial Board. Members of the NCEMSF Board of Directors may be invited to serve as peer reviewers. Individuals affiliated with NCEMSF, who do not serve on the Board of Directors, may be invited to serve on the JCEMS Editorial Board or as reviewers.

Intended Audience

JCEMS is designed for the entire collegiate EMS community, understood in a broad sense. Our primary anticipated audience is **collegiate EMS providers and leaders including student providers, medical directors, and professional advisors or managers**. Our content will also be relevant and accessible to:

Become a Reviewer

Qualifications

Potential reviewers are expected to meet the following qualifications, all of which should be listed in a CV or resume:

- Expertise in emergency medical services (EMS) or emergency medicine, or expertise in a relevant field (e.g. campus public health, campus public safety, student affairs, education, etc.), or expertise in a specific methodological discipline (e.g. statistics, survey design, etc.).
- One or more original research publication. This requirement may be waived provided the applicant demonstrates otherwise outstanding academic and scholarly achievement (e.g. published case reports or review articles, significant conference presentations, advanced academic degrees, editorial experience).

Expectations

Reviewers are expected to:

- Respond to an invitation to review a JCEMS manuscript within 3 days, indicating whether or not the reviewer accepts the invitation.
- Complete assigned reviews within 14 days of the initial invitation. Notify the editors if the review will not be completed within 14 days.
- Thoroughly familiarize themselves with JCEMS submission guidelines as detailed in the JCEMS Guide for Authors.
- Thoroughly familiarize themselves with ethical guidelines for research and publishing as outlined in the JCEMS Guide for Authors.
- Maintain confidentiality during the review process. Reviewers may not share manuscript details or identify themselves as a reviewer during the review process.
- Provide an unbiased review. If the reviewer believes that they know the identity of the author, or are otherwise unable to provide an unbiased review, it is the responsibility of the reviewer to contact an Editor.

Benefits

JCEMS reviewers enjoy the following benefits:

- An annual letter of gratitude written on official JCEMS letterhead for their academic record. The letter will note the number of reviews performed by the reviewer in the preceding year.
- Annual acknowledgment of the most active reviewers in the print version of JCEMS, with the permission of the acknowledged reviewers.
- Professional development, establishment of expertise, improvement of scholarly reputation, and contribution to the collegiate EMS community.

Application Process

Reviewers may be invited by the Editor-in-Chief or a designated member of the Editorial Board. In addition, individuals interested in being a reviewer should submit the following items to the Editor-in-Chief at JCEMS@ CollegeEMS.com:

- 1. CV/resume
- 2. Cover letter, detailing their interest and qualifications.
- 3. Contact information (email and phone) for three references who can attest to the applicant's qualifications and expertise. JCEMS prefers that reference(s) are individual(s) with editorial or review experience.
- 4. Optional: Letter(s) of recommendation, preferably from individual(s) with editorial or review experience. It is preferred that letters of recommendation be sent directly from the recommender, not the applicant.

Expectations

Editorial Board members are expected to:

- Coordinate with reviewers during the peer review process.
- Review and edit submitted manuscripts that undergo editorial review.
- Advise on journal policy, design, and scope.
- Attract new authors and manuscript submissions.
- Assist in the selection process of new reviewers and Editorial Board members.

Manuscript Review Process

Overview

Manuscripts classified as Original Research, Case Reports, or Reviews will undergo a double-blind, peer review process. Manuscripts classified as News and Commentary, Perspectives and Opinions, Advice and Practices, Product Reviews, or Letters to the Editor and Images, Video, Training Materials, or Agency Documents will undergo editorial review. For more information on manuscript classification, please see the JCEMS Guide for Authors. Reviewers are expected to thoroughly familiarize themselves with their roles in the peer review process.

Double-Blind Peer Review

Manuscripts classified as Original Research, Case Reports, or Reviews undergo a double-blind, peer review process. JCEMS employs a double-blind peer review process to ensure that manuscripts are fairly reviewed without bias

in accordance with strict ethical and professional guidelines. Revisions suggested by reviewers may dramatically strengthen the quality of submitted manuscripts. The process also ensures that published articles demonstrate the utmost level of accuracy, reliability, and methodological rigor. Double-blind, peer review is widely regarded as the gold-standard of publication review; the process is widely employed by top-ranking emergency medicine journals including Annals of Emergency Medicine and The American Journal of Emergency Medicine.

During the process, manuscripts are initially reviewed by our Editors for quality, relevance to the collegiate EMS community, and suitability for JCEMS. High-quality manuscripts that fit the scope of our scholarly journal will be assigned to one of our Editors or Editorial Board members who will identify at least two independent reviewers. Reviewers are recognized experts in the particular topic featured in the manuscript. Manuscripts presenting original research will be reviewed by reviewers with expertise in the specific research field, methodology, and data analysis presented. Reviewers will be double-blinded, meaning that neither the author nor the reviewers will know the identity of each other. Manuscripts may also be reviewed by additional members of our Editorial Board who will be blinded to the author.

Reviewers will provide a thorough review of the manuscript for quality, accuracy, scope, methodological rigor, depth of research, originality/novelty, and style/organization. Manuscripts will be further reviewed in terms of their implications for practice for collegiate EMS providers, leaders, advisors, and affiliated personnel. Manuscripts containing clinical or medical information will be reviewed by at least one reviewer with an advanced clinical degree (eg, MD, DO, PA-C, or NP) prior to acceptance.

After the first stage of peer review is complete, authors will be notified whether their manuscript has been accepted or rejected, or whether revisions are necessary. In most cases, prior to acceptance, major or minor revisions in a manuscript's content and/or writing will be necessary. Revisions for original research manuscripts may include the need for additional data collection and/or analysis. Manuscripts may undergo a second round of peer review after revisions are completed. Prior to publication, our editorial and publishing team will provide copy-editing and formatting assistance. Authors will receive a final, edited version of their article prior to publication. Final decisions on manuscript publication will be made by the Editor-in-Chief or a designated member of the Editorial Board without any relevant conflicts of interest.

Editorial Review

Manuscripts classified as News and Commentary, Perspectives and Opinions, Advice and Practices, Product Reviews, Editorials, Letters to the Editor, and Images, Videos, Training Materials, or Agency Documents undergo editorial review. Manuscripts are initially reviewed by our Editors for quality, relevance to the collegiate EMS community, and suitability for JCEMS. High-quality manuscripts that fit the scope of our scholarly journal will be fully reviewed by selected Editors and members of our Editorial Board. The Editorial Board will provide a thorough review of the manuscript for quality, accuracy, scope, methodological rigor, depth of research, originality/novelty, and style/organization. Manuscripts are further reviewed in terms of their implications for practice for collegiate EMS providers, leaders, advisors, and affiliated personnel. Manuscripts containing clinical or medical information are reviewed by at least one Editorial Board member with an advanced clinical degree (eg, MD, DO, PA-C, or NP) prior to acceptance.

After the first stage of peer review is complete, authors are notified whether their manuscript has been accepted or rejected, or whether author revisions are necessary. In most cases, prior to acceptance, major or minor revisions in a manuscript's content and/or writing will be necessary. Manuscripts may undergo a second round of editorial review after revisions are completed. Prior to publication, our editorial and publishing team will provide copyediting and formatting assistance. Authors will receive a final, edited version of their article prior to publication. Final decisions on manuscript publication will be made by the Editor-in-Chief, or a designated member of the Editorial Board without any relevant conflicts of interest.

Manuscript Review Form
